



How to start an apprenticeship or traineeship









Step 1 Choose...

Choose which apprenticeship or traineeship you would like to do. What trade or industry are you interested in? Think about your skills, passion and what sort of work you're interested in doing Create a resume that showcases your skills and attributes that can be applied to the particular apprenticeship or traineeship you are seeking.

Step 2 Seek...

Find an employer. There are a variety of resources and many different ways you can find an employer. Here are a couple of good ways to start:

- Tell friends and family you are looking for an apprenticeship or traineeship. Ask them if they know anyone you can talk with.
- Network and search online job ads, in newspapers, talk to local businesses or visit building sites
 and find out how they recruit for apprentices or trainees.

Step 3 Select...

Once an employer agrees to employ you as an apprentice or trainee, the next step is for you both to sign-up and register at your chosen AASN or GTO and select The Gordon as your preferred training provider. The Gordon contacts your employer once the registration is received and training can commence.

Training

Your apprenticeship or traineeship is generally made up of two types of training:

- · on-job training (learning on the job under your employer or supervisor) and off-job training.
- · off-job training is usually carried out by the training provider in classrooms or workshops.

Some things you should know

Although no prior study is required to start an Australian apprenticeship, if you want to gain some valuable starting knowledge and experience in an industry or trade job, try a low cost short course, such as a pre-apprenticeship.

Pre-apprenticeship benefits:

- A 14 19 week intensive course, usually offered 4 days per week and combines hands-on with theory training in a range of different trades.
- Introductory units to build fundamental skills enable students to be 'site ready' and prepare you to make an effective approach employers.
- Increase employment outcomes with employers who look favourably at pre-apprenticeship students being site or work ready.
- · Gain credit towards some apprenticeship courses

Eligibility

You can do an Australian apprenticeship as soon as you reach a working age. If you are a school leaver, re-entering the workforce or as an adult worker simply wishing to change careers or gain new skills you are also eligible. You are even eligible to start whilst you are in secondary school and finishing Years 11 and 12. Australian apprenticeships and traineeships are available to those who are:

- · an Australian citizen, or a permanent resident;
- · New Zealand passport holders who has been resident in Australia for more than six months; and
- temporary resident or hold a working visa of sufficient duration to undertake the apprenticeship or traineeship.

If you have skills or have undertaken training overseas you may be eligible for credits towards an accredited Australian course at The Gordon. For more information, refer to:

Secondary school students

- You can begin your training for a job or trade while you're at school.
